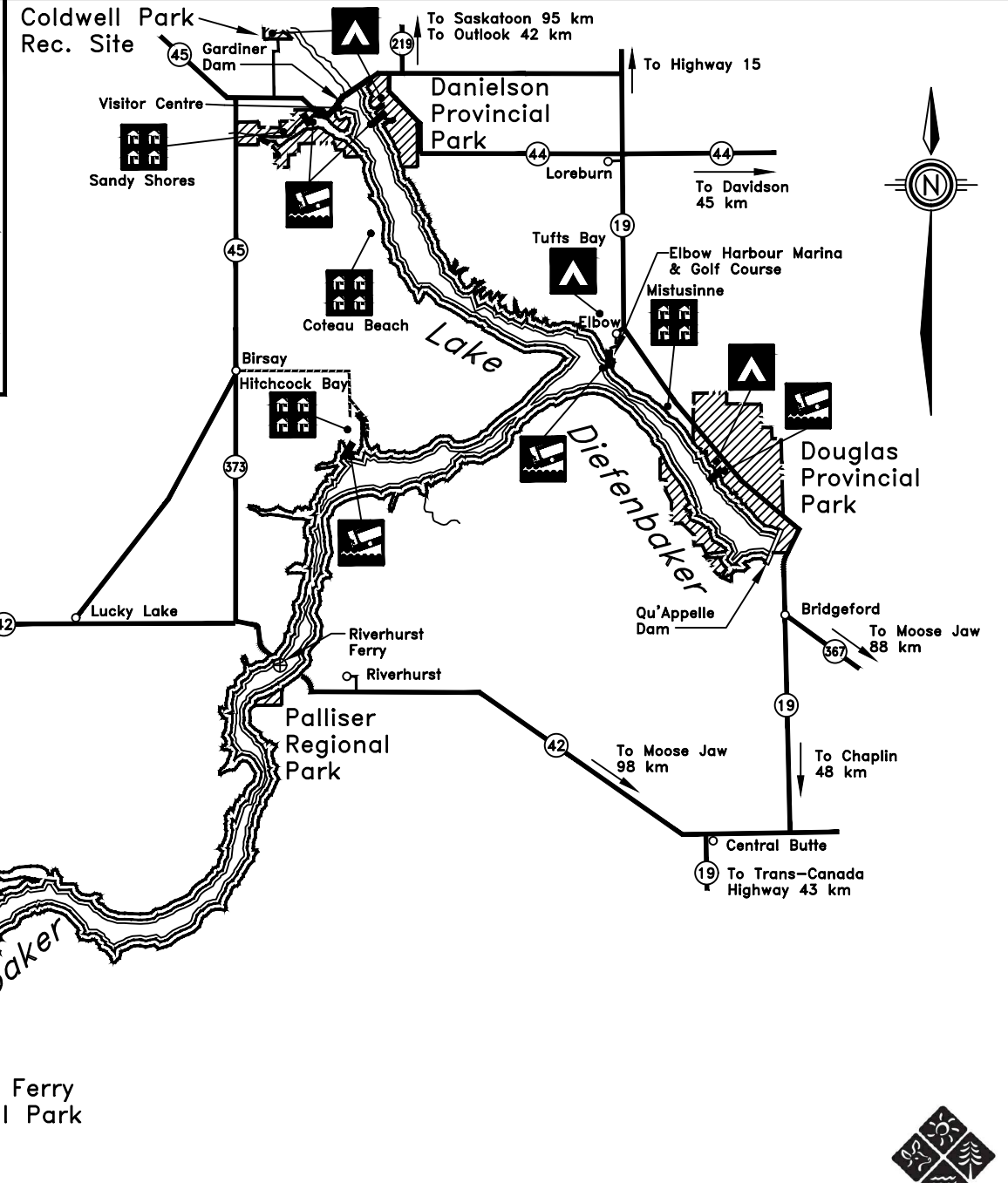

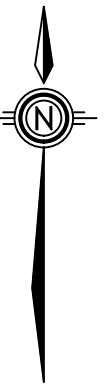

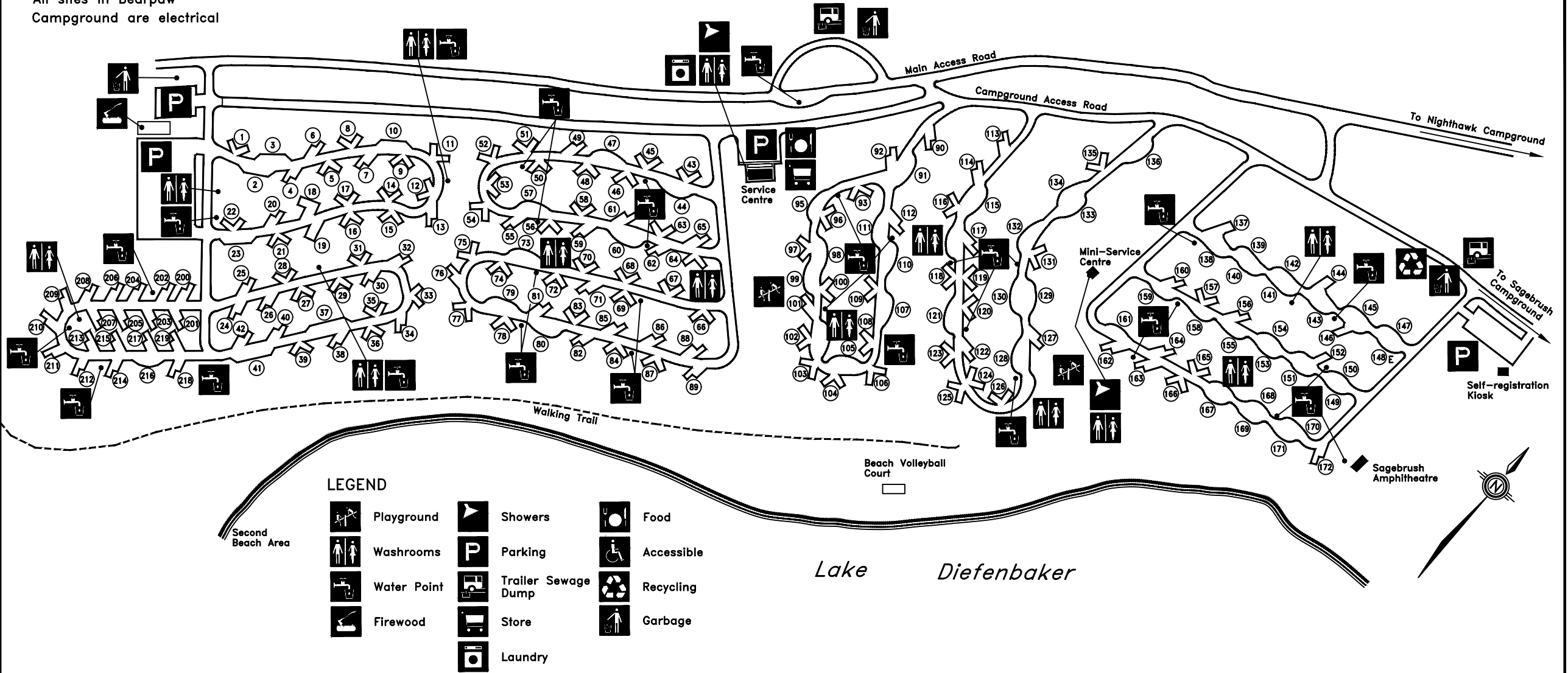
Location Map

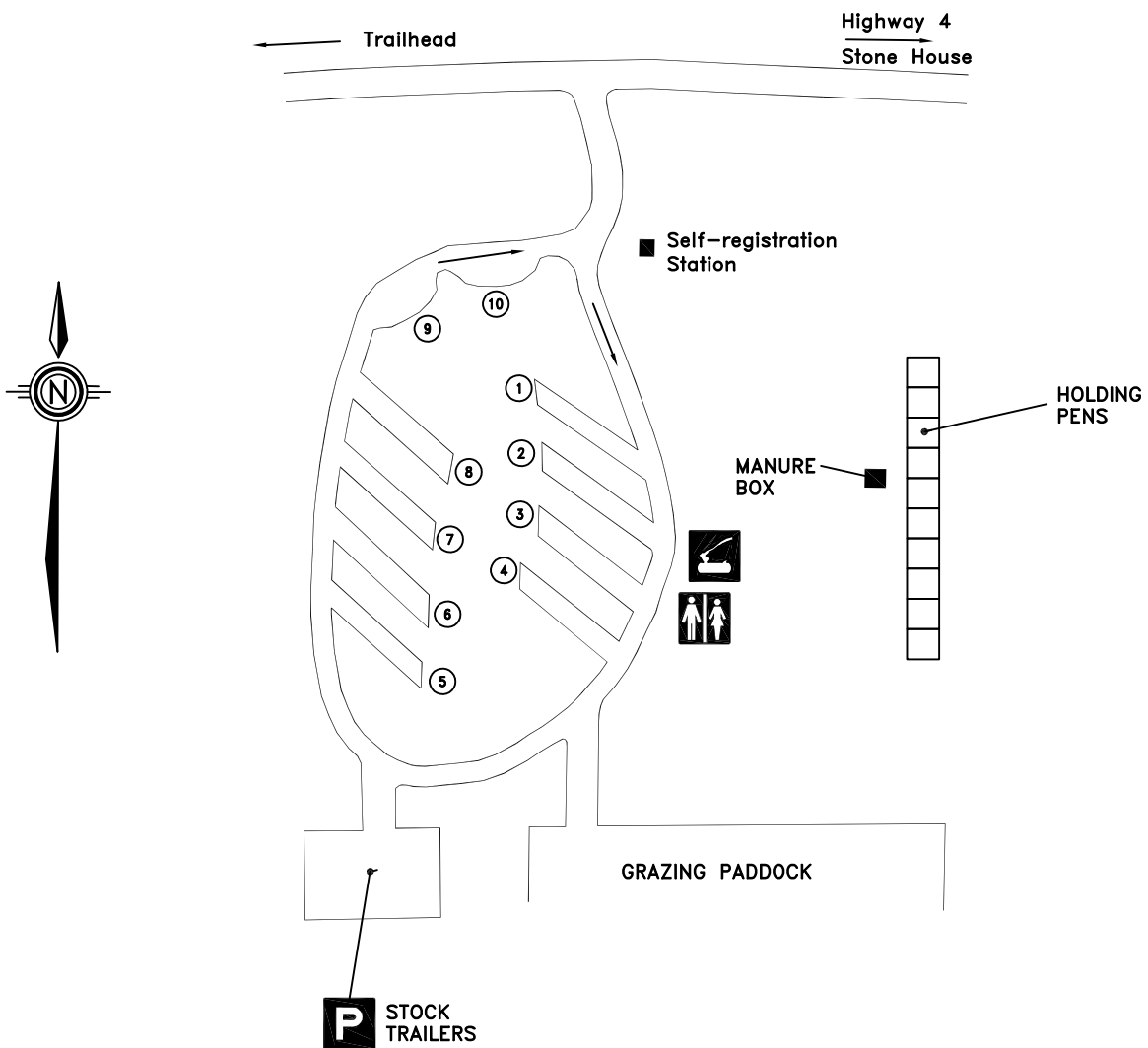

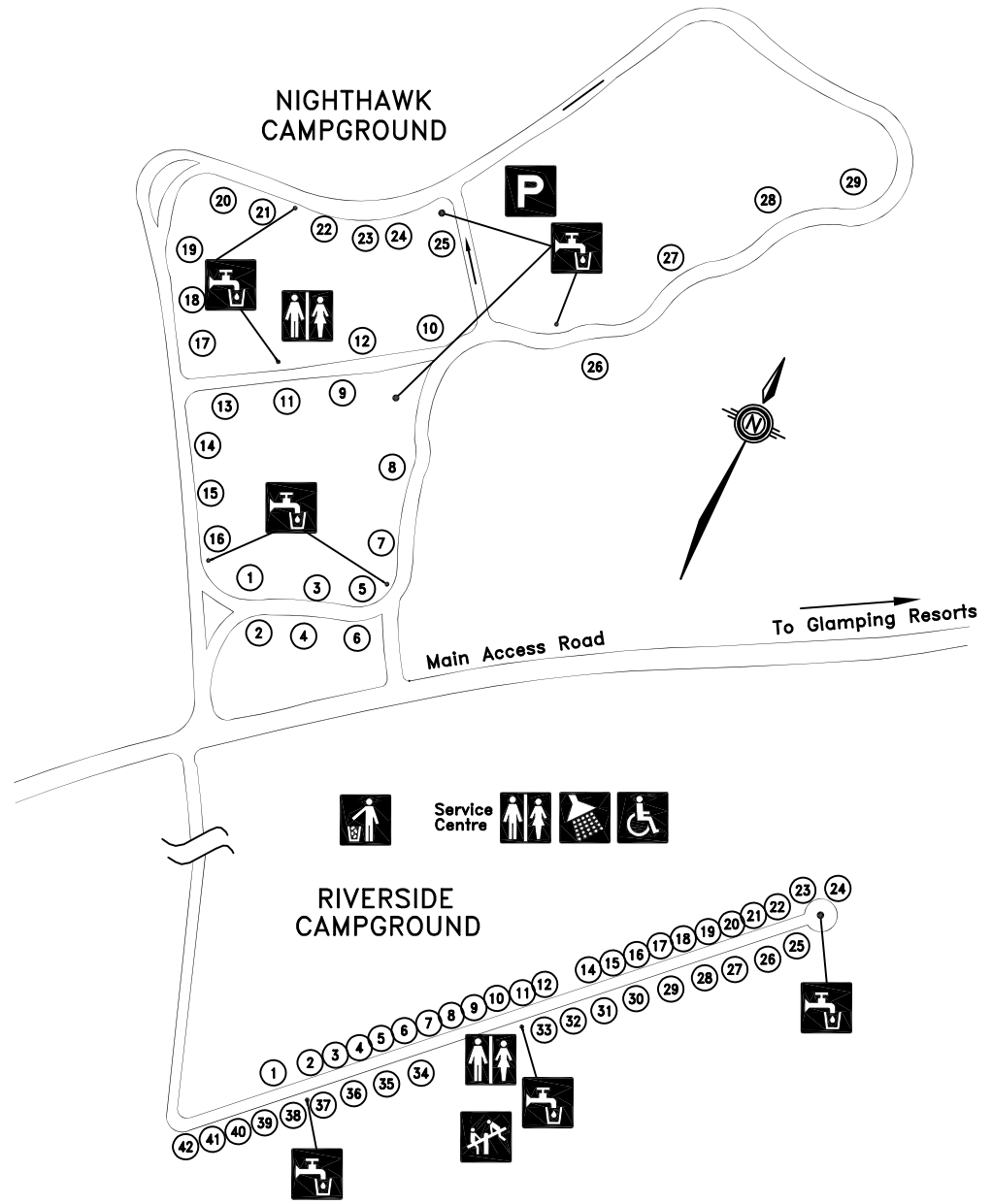
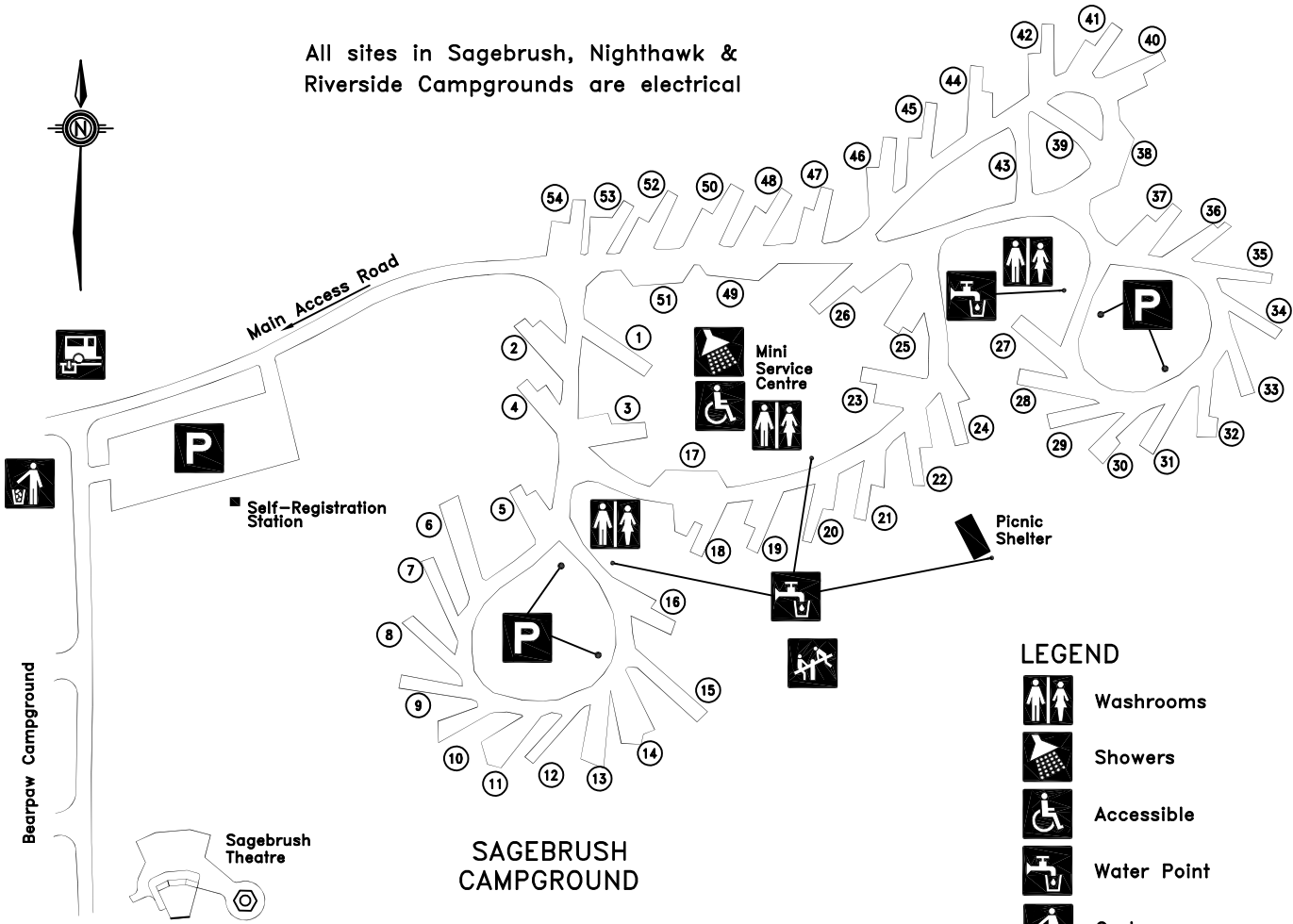

# Saskatchewan Landing Provincial Park

## What to do...

### Camping

The park has seven campgrounds with a total of 380 campsites. Most park services are available from mid-May to the end of September. The main campgrounds have four service centres with free showers. A convenience store carries groceries and fast food. Saskatchewan Landing Provincial Park also offers a trailer sewage-drop station, firewood, group camping area and an equestrian camping area.

### Hiking

If you enjoy a leisurely stroll or a more challenging trek, Saskatchewan Landing Provincial Park has three self-interpretive hiking trails: Prairie Vista begins at the trailhead west of Goodwin House; Ridges and Ravines begins at the northwest end of Bearpaw Campground and Rings, Ruts & Remnants begins just east of the Goodwin House Visitor Centre, across from Highway #4.

### Day Use and Swimming

The main beach and picnic area are located in the northwest portion (day-use area) of the park, on the west side of Highway #4. Catch some rays on the beach or lounge on the luxurious lawn under the majestic cottonwood trees. Picnic facilities and a playground are located between the beach and the parking lot. Picnic tables are provided for your convenience. A dip in the shimmering waters of Lake Diefenbaker will complete your day. Change-room facilities are provided. Beach areas are not supervised by lifeguards. Parents are asked to assume responsibility for their children's health and welfare at all times.

### Fishing

Lake Diefenbaker is one of the most popular angling waterbodies in southern Saskatchewan. It is home to 11 game-fish including walleye, northern pike, sauger, burbot, lake trout, yellow perch and goldeye.

### Boating

Looking for water recreation at its finest? Lake Diefenbaker has it all! The sparkling, crystal water that reflects Saskatchewan's bright sky make windsurfing, sailing and waterskiing a thrill. The primary marina and boat launch are located east of Highway #4, on the north side of the lake. A second boat launch is located west of Highway #4.

### Golfing

Enjoy a round of golf on the beautiful 18-hole championship golf course located east of highway #4 on the north side of the lake.

### Mini Golf

Come and enjoy the challenging 18-hole mini-golf located at the marina.

### Birding

Saskatchewan Landing Provincial Park is paradise for any birding enthusiast, especially in the spring and fall when birds are migrating. Remember to pack your binoculars.

### Park Visitor Programs

Summer programs are offered throughout July and August by the Park Interpreter. Programs are listed in the Summer Program Calendar online or various locations throughout the park.

### Sask. Landing Store

Sask. Landing Store has fast food & dry goods/groceries. It is located in the Bearpaw Campground. Phone: 306-375-2600.

### Sask. Landing Golf Resort

Sask. Landing Golf Resort has an 18-hole golf course, a pro-shop and licensed dining. It is located in the northeast portion of the park. Phone: 306-375-2233.

### Sask. Landing Marina

Sask. Landing Marina rents boatslips, boat fuel and fishing & camping supplies. Sask. Landing Marina operates the 18-hole minigolf and is located in the northeast portion of the park. Phone: 306-375-2822.

### Equestrian Camping

Equestrian camping is ideal for campers who wish to travel with their horses and explore the park on horseback. Services offered are holding pens, tie stalls, fenced grazing paddock and

access to water....and that's just for the horses. Human companions will be looked after as well, with non-electric campsites located within the same area as the horses. The equestrian campground is located on the south side of Lake Diefenbaker, west of the Goodwin House Visitor Centre. There are no designated trails but you may ride from the equestrian campground to wherever your horse may take you south of the river.

## For Your Comfort and Safety

### Public Safety

Although Ministry of Environment conservation officers and special constables patrol the park, please do not leave valuables unattended or in open view. If you have a problem, contact the Campground Office at 306-375-5527 or the Goodwin House at 306-375-5525.

### Pets

**Please be a responsible pet owner.** For your safety and enjoyment of others please keep your pet(s) on a leash at all times. Pets are not allowed on beaches. Dogs running loose or left barking in campsites can disturb the enjoyment of other park visitors. Please clean up after your pet.

### Park Guidelines & Regulations

- ATVs are not allowed.
- No camping in areas other than designated park campsites.
- Alcohol and cannabis may be consumed only in your campsite. Alcohol and cannabis are not permitted in other areas including beaches, picnic areas or roadways.
- Fires are permitted in park barbeques/fire pits only.
- All vehicles are restricted to park roads at all times.

# Lake Diefenbaker

## Saskatchewan's "Great" Lake



**Lake Diefenbaker was created by the construction of the Gardiner Dam and its smaller counterpart the Qu'Appelle River Dam. The South Saskatchewan River Project, which officially opened in 1967, took eight years to complete. The project cost \$120 million. Today it would cost more than \$1 billion.**

**Gardiner Dam is named after James Gardiner. He was the Premier of Saskatchewan from 1926 to 1929 and from 1934 to 1935. He was also the federal Minister of Agriculture from 1935 to 1957.**

**The reservoir, Lake Diefenbaker, is named after Canada's 13th Prime Minister, John G. Diefenbaker. John Diefenbaker was the only Prime Minister from Saskatchewan**

## Did You Know?

The excavation required during construction would make a hole in the ground the size of a city block and approximately 2.4 kilometres deep.

The steel used in the project would make a 0.95 centimetre rod long enough to stretch around the world.

The cement used in the project would fill 3,000 freight cars.

The concrete used in the project would be enough to build a two-lane highway from Regina to Prince Albert; approximately 362 kilometres.

Ninety-four per cent of the water released from Lake Diefenbaker flows through the Coteau Creek Power Station which produces electricity.

The diversion tunnels direct water into the electricity generating turbines in the power station. They also help regulate the flow of the South Saskatchewan River. The diversion tunnels are large enough for a train to pass through.

Gardiner Dam is 64 metres high, 5,000 metres long and 1,600 metres wide at its base. The spillway is more than one kilometre long and can release as much as 7,500 cubic metres of water every second.

Lake Diefenbaker is 225 kilometres long, 54 metres deep at the dam and has more than 800 kilometres of shoreline.

The level of the lake can fluctuate as much as 11 metres annually.

Prior to the South Saskatchewan River Project, water users along the river used less than one per cent of the river's annual, average flow. Today, 45 per cent of the province's population gets its drinking water from the South Saskatchewan River system.

The lake provides irrigation for about 42,900 hectares of farmland. Producers grow crops such as alfalfa, canola, flax, beans, potatoes, barley and wheat. The lake is also the source of water for several potash mines, a canola-processing mill, an alfalfa processing plant, an ammonium nitrate producer, a commercial fish farm, numerous hog and livestock operations and a variety of other industries.

Lake Diefenbaker loses a lot of water to evaporation. An average of 345,000 cubic decametres of water evaporates every year. This is comparable to losing the water from 90,000 Olympic-size swimming pools.

Lake Diefenbaker is a major recreation and tourism destination. Douglas Provincial Park, Danielson Provincial Park and Saskatchewan Landing Provincial Park are situated on the lake. There are also golf courses, cottage subdivisions, resort villages and three full-service marinas. The kilometres of unspoiled beaches and huge body of water have something to offer everyone who enjoys water-based recreation.

The lake is home to 27 species of fish. Anglers will find walleye, northern pike, rainbow trout, sauger, yellow perch, whitefish, lake trout, goldeye and burbot. The steady wind at Lake Diefenbaker makes it a very popular choice for sailing enthusiasts.

Be sure and visit the Gardiner Dam Visitor Centre, situated on the top of Gardiner Dam. It is open from the May long-weekend to Labour Day. Take the time to view the informative displays and videos in our theatre. Staff at the Visitor Centre will be pleased to answer your questions about the lake and the surrounding areas. Guided tours through the Coteau Creek Power Station at the base of the dam are also available. If you get hungry, dine at the Visitor Centre restaurant, or pack a picnic lunch to enjoy on the beach.
